Activity Ideas to Support Home Learning – Key Stage 2

- o Hangman
- Junior scrabble 0
- Go on a "word walk" identify items that can be described by a particular word e.g. glistening. 0

- Extend the child's vocabulary by highlighting words they may not know and ask them to find out what they mean. Put the new words on the fridge and discuss them.
- When learning a new word investigate what it rhymes with, how many syllables it has, what it starts with, use the word in a sentence
- Play word association games e.g., tree, wood, pencil etc
- o Play memory games- I went to market and I bought
- Play guessing games such as animal, vegetable or mineral in which the child needs to ask questions to be able to guess what their partner is thinking about using 20 questions but their partner can only answer yes or no.
- o Think of a category e.g. things with wheels and try to think of as many things in that category
- \circ $\;$ Guess the name of a famous person written down and stuck on foreheads
- When on a walk/looking at items in the house ask the child to look for things that start with a particular phoneme, share an attribute e.g. metal or think of an adjective from each letter of their name.
- Use verbs within cooking activities, e.g. pouring, sifting, kneading, stirring
- When reading stories, ask what the child thinks might happen next, discuss emotions e.g. when might you feel serene, ask them to write an ending to the story.
- Discuss vocabulary in stories e.g. from Danny the Champion of the World-what animal might snuffle, describe snuffle to your brother/sister, put the word snuffle into a sentence.
- Take it in turns to make up a sentence to make a story, this can be using the new words learned that week.
- Make up a feely bag with interesting objects in and take it in turns to describe the object or find the object e.g. find me something that is a sphere, made of plastic and that we can throw, find me something fragile
- Play a game concentrating on things that are NOT, e.g. name part of a tree that is not a branch-leaf, twig etc
- Have an idiom of the week e.g. driving me up the wall!!, discuss it, draw a picture of it and write down all of the things they know about it, try and use the idiom that week.
- Take pictures of your child completing an activity, e.g. washing up, or get your child to take a picture of you doing each stage of the activity, see if they can retell the "story of the activity" in the order in which it took place.

Hearing Technology (where applicable)	Supporting Communication
 Remember to make regular checks that your child's hearing technology is working correctly – use sound checks such as the LING sound check (oo/ah/mm/ee/ss/sh) to ensure that your child is hearing across the frequencies Clean hearing aid moulds and tubes daily, encourage your child to help with this if they can Contact audiology as normal if you run out of tubes or batteries. If you have problems accessing spares, contact your child's Teacher of the Deaf If your child has brought their radio aid home from school, please take extra care of it. If your child has non-integrated receivers attached to their hearing aids, please remove these and store them in a safe place when the radio aid is not in use.
